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
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
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What's New

Students must have a complete application and official SUNY Buffalo State acceptance prior to sitting in courses. If a student does not plan to enroll in a course until after the application deadline has passed, they are now required to apply before the dates below:


Fall 2018 Application Deadlines (Courses taken between August 1 and December 1)

- Online Application must be completed and submitted by October 15, 2018
- All supplemental materials must be submitted by November 15, 2018

Spring 2019 Application Deadlines (Courses taken between December 1 and May 1)

- Online Application must be completed and submitted by March 15, 2019
- All supplemental materials must be submitted by April 15, 2019

She develops creativity curriculum for learners of all ages and facilitates teams and organizations to lead change.

Dr. Keller-Mathers will continue to serve as Interim Director of IGPE until the close of the Spring 2018 semester.

IGPE Student Published with Master's Project Instructor Collaboration

Congratulations to Bradley Evans of the Shanghai American School for the submission of the article entitled *Using the Cornell Note-taking System Can Help Eighth Grade Students Alleviate the Impact of Interruptions While Reading at Home* for publication. Bradley and Dr. Chris Shively collaborated on this submission which was result of Bradley's master's project for his MS in Multidisciplinary Studies degree. Here is the abstract of the submission:

A large group of eighth-grade social studies students (N=-101) received instruction and practice using the Cornell note-taking system and were assigned to one of three note-taking groups or one non-note-taking group. Students were asked to read an article about persuasion and use their assigned note-taking system to take notes at home. A 10-question multiple choice reading comprehension test and questionnaire were given. A one-way ANOVA found a significance in the group's means and a Tukey HSD found significant differences between each note-taking group and the non-note-taking group. The students' self-reported feelings of preparedness, their time spent reading and taking notes, overall comments about their experience and their reporting of interruptions were analyzed using constant comparisons and questioning strategies. Two conclusions can be drawn from these results. First, middle school students must take some form of notes to benefit from the encoding process while reading. Secondly, middle school teachers should not fear giving their students reading and note-taking homework assignments. This study provides evidence that supports the idea that the Cornell system can be used to increase student confidence and alleviate the impact interruptions have on students' working memories while reading at home.
